PREFACE

This History of the EGL is a condensation of a great mass of pictures, annuals, and scattered fond memories. Once compiled, we see the picture of the League as a living entity:

1930's - The seed was sown among a small group of friends. Golf, horseshoes, and fishing fostered the friendship.

1940's - Activity expanded into a full League. Membership grew. Gatherings became more frequent. The seed blossomed.

1950's - The League literally burst with new growth. With the advent of a zealous new membership, major events were planned year-round. It was a social club as well as a golf league. The year-books reflected the good cheer, and the treasury was swollen with revenue.

1960's - This was a period of the status quo. The social activity slackened slightly, but the League remained in high gear.

1970's - A most critical period. More emphasis was placed upon a serious game of golf, and the social aspects of the EGL dimmed. As the seventies drew to a close, the League passed a crucial stage with the admittance of the first women. Though the League gained in numbers, it also lost some senior members in the controversy.

1980's - The League faces the future; what club do we pull from the bag?

An historical summary appears periodically in the series of League annuals. The following is that section of the summary that pertains to the beginning years. Author: Jim Aldrich.

THE AC EFFICIENCY GOLF LEAGUE ORIGIN and GROWTH J.O.A.

Founded in 1931 by John Schonveld for the sole purpose of promoting good fellow-ship among its members.

Charter members were J. Schonveld, C. Simms, Ralph Cross, Meredith Spear, Alex Chisholm, Charles Fowler, Joe Carah and Warren Milner.

Golf apparently was not the sole diversion in the earlier years; as noted in the reproduction of the first league memorandum. Horseshoes and fishing were also included as a part of the annual outing.

Even in those early years, John's ability to organize and promote was most evident. You will note that on Page 1 of the memorandum, he has already assigned all the work to others, leaving himself free to thoroughly enjoy the week end. Even the two typists were not forgotten.

As now, good humor and practical jokes were prevalent at the outings - fish are necessary for a fish dinner, so why would "Spike" Spear, hold up 2 beautiful black bass, for the occupants of the neighboring boat to see, then deliberately drop them back into the lake?

Property boundary line arguments are not unusual - John can probably explain how the group happened to be pitching horse-shoes on his neighbors property - we understand the discussion was brief but quite vigorous while it lasted.

How did the limburger cheese get on the steering wheel of Alex Chisholm's car? And who plugged up the chimney of the cottage, because they were refused admittance?

Over the years, the founder, charter members and those who followed, never lost sight of the leagues original purpose and it is a tribute to those men that so many of their contributions to the promotion and development of the league, formed the very foundation upon which we operate today.

Our founding fathers were a proper example to us all, treating all matters with the essential levity. Note the following:

July 20, 1932

The yearly golf, horse shoe and fishing tournament will be held by the members and ex-members of the Efficiency Department at John Schonveld's cottage, location Byron Lake one mile west Linden July 23rd and 24th.

Anyone wishing to come on the evening of the 22nd is welcome with the understanding that there will be no meals served on that date.

On the morning of the 23rd all will gather at the Long Lake Golf Course where the fun will begin. 18 holes of golf must be played with each personkeeping his own score to avoid the scores running too high. Rubber balls such as purchased by Bill Milner at the Ten Cent Store are not to be used unless Bill will furnish such balls free of charge to the other golfers participating in these doings.

The Main Plant team will be Spear, Cross, Simms, Schonveld.

Plant Four - Milner, Fowler, Carah, Chisholm.

The penalty for losing the 1931 tournament by Plant Four to the Main Plant will be as follows:

Joe Carah will carry Schonveld's clubs and bags.

Chisholm will carry Simms clubs and bags. Fowler being a married man will carry the only club in Spear's possession.

Milner will carry the golf sticks and bags of Cross.

Cross will not be allowed to bring a hoe, although a rake to fish the golf balls out of the creek will be in order.

After the Main Plant team has defeated the Plant Four team a lunch will behad at the Long Lake Golf Club House, each man to pay for his own dinner.

After the dinner is over the horseshoe tournament will be held.

Rules and regulations shall be prepared by Milner and Spear.

In the case of disagreement regarding the rules, Ralph Cross will make the necessary decisions, and in all cases should favor the Main Plant.

The fishing tournament will start as soon as the horse-shoe tournament is won by the Main Plant.

Rules of the fishing tournament.

All fish must be within the regular size.
No fishing allowed with bare hooks unless casting is done.
Fish as long as you want between four o'clock Saturday afternoon until nine
Sunday morning.
The teams will segregate the various kinds of fish.
Blue Gills, Perch, Pike, Bass, Bullheads and Sun Fish.
Length of each kind of fish and quantity will determine the winner.
The losing team will clean all the fish.

THE 40's LEAGUE TAKES SHAPE

The historical summary continues...

In 1942, Clock Watchers Ball, a new event, was one of many expansion type projects, which indicated that the league was firmly established. This event has since been replaced by fall and spring dances.

The Millionaires Party, organized in 1948 was a partial answer to the need for obtaining some financial aid to lighten the annual outing expenses and to make available some funds for other league activities. It takes a well organized group to put this party on today, and the chairman with his various committees, must plan ahead carefully and employ creative thinking in order to maintain the high standard of excellence which our guests have learned to expect of this event. It is truly a "production" in every sense of the word, and when the auction starts at midnight, every "slave" member knows he has done an evenings work.

Our Constitution and Year Book was also established in 1948.

Opening golf night, once a sort of run-of-the-mill affair, has been elevated to the high level of the other league functions - with a gathering of the clan immediately after the game is over, at some local "pub" for food and other goodies for the inner man - this gathering serves also to acquaint the new members with the other players, many of whom they do not see too often in their regular round of work.

Guest Night, traditionally held at some Golf Club in mid-July came about as a result of the Millionaires Party. It was designed as a sort of "thank you" party for those who so faithfully support the Millionaires Party year after year. It has become a meeting place for many friends outside of the league, who come for golf, and dinner and spend a most enjoyable evening in visiting with old friends, and business associates.

The Annual Outing - The gala event of the year, is of course a carry-over from the founding days - this function which starts promptly at 5:00 p.m. on a designated Friday, usually the first or second Friday after Labor Day, climaxing a season of golf league activities. It is a week end which features the very best in golf, food, entertainment, good humor, and where many unexpected, unannounced and sometimes novel happenings occur. It is at this party that the current officers bow out, and a new group steps into and up to the responsibility of directing the affairs of the organization for the coming year.

According to the 1948 EGL yearbook, the following are the rules for "Golf Playing":

- 1. A fee of \$1.00 called a "behaviour deposit" will be requested from each playing member to cover fine assessments.
- 2. Fines are as follows:
 - a. Driving into players \$.25 1st offense, \$.50 2nd, etc.
 - b. Yelling "four, five, or any numeral" without cause, or for not yelling "fore" with cause. \$.05 per offense.
 - c. Buying drinks before match for opposing team with dishonorable intentions. No fine.
 - d. Any member disagreeing with the above rules shall be fined \$1.00.

Our historical summary proceeds with the '50's:

League champions and runner-ups have their moment of glory too, as this is a prize awarding event for them.

The Schonveld trophy established in 1955, for outstanding service to the league and the Achievement Award plaque (1959) are other coveted presentations. Prizes directly connected with the week end golf play are also distributed.

The inauguration of bus transportation, which was first tried out in 1956 has proven very popular. An added attraction in 1958 was the awarding a a free ride to the occupant whose name was drawn at random, after the bus was under way, and who was then privileged to wear the "King of the Bus" crown for the remainder of the trip.

It is one of the all too infrequent times when we are privileged to have as participants other members, whose heavy responsibilities at AC prevents their regular appearance on the golf course and at other season events.


Outings have been held at Byron, Crystal Downs, Houghton Lake, Fenton (war-time version), Charlevoix and Grand Haven.




1954 was a key year...

- ... The first Schonveld Trophy was awarded.









From the yearbook...

THE YEAR 1966 WAS A MEMORABLE YEAR FOR E. G. L. GOLF. LEAGUE MEMBERS ENJOYED FOURTEEN NIGHTS OF COMPETITION WITH THREE PARTY NIGHTS MIXED IN TO ENHANCE THE GOLF. OPENING NIGHT FESTIVITIES WERE HELD AT THE DAVISON COUNTRY CLUB AND JUDGING BY THE REACTION OF LEAGUE MEMBERS IN ATTENDANCE, THE CHANGE IN GOLF COURSES WAS A WELCOME ONE. REGULAR LEAGUE PLAY WAS OVER THE FAMILIAR BRICKYARD WITH FOUR FLIGHTS GOING RIGHT DOWN TO THE WIRE BEFORE CHAMPIONS WERE DETERMINED. THE PLAYOFF FOR THE LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP AND THE CLOSING NIGHT WAS HELD AT I.M.A. BROOKWOOD WHERE THE GOLF AND REFRESHMENT FACILITIES WERE APPRECIATED BY ALL PARTICIPATING LEAGUE MEMBERS.

THE 1966 E.G.L. CHAMPIONS WERE KEN CARLSON AND AL LASKI. RUNNER-UP HONORS WENT TO THE TEAM OF JIM ALLEN, JIM KARN, AND WALT MASON. THIRD PLACE WAS CLAIMED BY TED BENNETT AND JOHN VAUGHAN. FOURTH PLACE WINNERS WERE RALPH CROSS AND BOB PETERSON.

THE GOLF SEASON WAS A FINANCIAL SUCCESS AS WELL AND THE CONTRIBUTION MADE BY THE MILLIONAIRE'S SUMMER GOLF STAG WAS LARGELY RESPONSIBLE. THIS EVENT WAS HELD AT I.M.A. BROOKWOOD AND FOR THE FIRST TIME, IT WAS PRACTICALLY SELF SUPPORTING. CHAIRMAN JOHN RAINNEY AND ALL MEMBERS WORKING THE STAG DID AN OUTSTANDING JOB ON THE ANNUAL EVENT.






